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# executive summary

The 5th TFNet General Assembly held in Guangzhou, China on 21 June 2012, was attended by 31 delegates comprising board members, observers and the Secretariat. It was chaired by the representative from host country China, Dr. Yi Ganjun. A progress report covering activities of TFNet from 2009 to 2012, financial report for the same period and future directions was presented by the CEO. The assembly saw the appointment of new board members for the term 2012 – 2015. The assembly also endorsed the constitutional amendment that all country members are members of the board. Other issues deliberated and established during the assembly were:

- a. Due to the lack of nominations, the Assembly agreed that the appointment of the 2 expert members of the board be deferred. The Secretariat has been given 3 6 months to facilitate their appointment.
- b. TFNet to aggressively source for funding and projects from international bodies, including CFC (Common Fund for Commodities)
- c. The appointment of the representative from Australia and Sudan as internal auditors for TFNet
- d. TFNet to build up its database of experts/resource persons to improve the proficiency of the organisation.
- e. A new capability statement is required to effectively promote the capabilities of the organisation.
- f. TFNet to participate in conferences and symposiums to promote the organisation.
- g. Bureaus to be set up in member countries to provide information to the secretariat and promote TFNet.
- h. TFNet to collaborate with IICA to establish the Latin and Caribbean network by end 2012. The African TFNet will be expanded to include more country members.
- i. TFNet to look into the possibility of providing information and services in trade, sanitary and phytosanitary regulations, and germplasm exchange programs.
- j. The TFNet website to be tailored to members' needs.
- k. TFNet to enhance collaboration with regional networks such as IICA, AARDO and ICIPE.

The 6th Board of Trustees meeting, which was held after the General Assembly, saw the reappointment of Malaysian representative HE Dato' Mohd Hashim Abdullah as Board Chairperson.

The Board decided to extend the term of the current CEO for 2 years. The representative from Vietnam offered to host the next board meeting in Ho Chi Minh City, South Vietnam in June 2013.

# introduction

The 5th Session of TFNet General Assembly (GA) was held in Guangzhou, People's Republic of China on 21st June 2012. It was attended by 31 delegates from 11 countries, including a representative from Food and Agriculture Organisation (FAO) of United Nations, Rome; observers from Afro-Asian Rural Development Organization(AARDO); the Fiji Ambassador to China, Common Fund for Commodities (CFC); and Inter-American Institute for Cooperation on Agriculture (IICA) and the TFNet Secretariat. The attendance list is appended in **Annex 1**.

The GA was officiated by the Honourable Ms. Long Xi from Ministry of Agriculture, Beijing. In her officiating speech Ms. Long Xi welcomed all delegates and thanked TFNet for hosting the General Assembly in Guangzhou, China. She pointed out that Guangdong Province is the third largest in terms of agricultural production in China and is an appropriate place to have the Assembly. Ms. Long Xi also expressed her hope that the GA would be beneficial in charting the future plans for TFNet in serving the stakeholders of the industry.

She highlighted that tropical fruit industry in China need to be further expanded to reduce the import of tropical fruits. China has also embarked on steps to further improve the production of tropical and sub-tropical fruit.

She also commended the good work of the Fruit Tree Research Institute, Guangdong Province in continuing the collaboration with TFNet at the regional and international level. She wished all the delegates of the GA to have a fruitful meeting and enjoy their stay in Guangzhou.

# agenda item 1

### Introduction and Opening Address of Chairperson

The Chief Executive Officer of TFNet, welcomed the delegates and introduced Dr. Yi Ganjun, representative of the host Government, as the Assembly Chairperson. TFNet CEO also proposed the representative from Malaysia HE Dato' Mohd Hashim Abdullah be appointed as 1st Vice Chairperson and H.E Commodore Esala Teleni, Ambassador of Fiji to China as 2nd Vice-Chairperson. Delegates agreed to the proposal.

Dr. Yi Ganjun welcomed all delegates and proceeded to thank those involved in the "International Symposium on Tropical and Subtropical Fruits" for successfully organizing the event.

He reminded delegates to review the activities executed by TFNet since the last General Assembly and also asked them to present their recommendations and suggestions in guiding the programmes and activities of TFNet in the coming years. Delegates were then requested to introduce themselves.

# agenda item 2

### ADOPTION OF PROVISIONAL AGENDA

# agenda item 3

### ADOPTION OF REPORT OF BOARD OF TRUSTEES MEETING - 2011

The Report of the Board of Trustees meeting held on 26-28 July 2011 in Bandung, Indonesia was adopted by the General Assembly. The Chief Executive Officer of TFNet, Mr.Yacob Ahmad, said that the report had been circulated to board members and is also available on the website.

# agenda item 4

### TFNet Progress Report (2009-2012)

TFNet CEO presented the progress report for 2009-2012, which consisted of projects, capacity building workshops, international meetings, finance, membership status and the future direction of TFNet.

He highlighted the action plan and the corresponding outcome from the 15 strategic initiatives implemented by TFNet since 2009. The strategic key result areas were membership, financial sustainability, products and services, corporate communications, and capacity and capability building.

The CEO continued on the progress of capacity building activities that were carried out or co-organised by TFNet. Five seminars, five workshops and two training/study visits were carried out during this period.

The CEO highlighted projects that have been completed such as the consultancy for the Development of a Business Strategy and Implementation Plan for the Establishment of "Agri-Production Park" in East Coast Region, Malaysia. Another project on citrus for Indonesia and Laos is still on hold, pending agreement by the countries involved.

TFNet also participated in three different regional forums, namely in IGG, FAO meeting in Rome, a CFC workshop in Mexico and IGG FAO Meeting in Cameroon.

On information exchange, the CEO reported that a new website has been developed with more features, including guest comments. Existing features include a Fruit Information Database, Tropical Fruit Trade Directory, TFNetSTAT, E-newsletter, and expert list.

TFNet CEO reported that during the period (2010 - 2012), TFNet membership grew by 26% from 119 in 2009 to 146 on 20th June 2012. The present membership composed of 12 Country Members, 15 Associate Members and 119 Ordinary members.

On the financial status, the audited financial report for (2009-2011) indicated that the total income received for the year 2011 has declined 42% from US\$ 653,650 in 2010 to US\$ 383,998. Major source of income for 2009 and 2010 were grants from the Malaysian Government, while in 2011 it was from consultancy services. Major expenditures were administrative and staff costs.

The full report is presented in **Annex 3**.

### DISCUSSIONS ON PROGRESS REPORT

i. The representative from Malaysia, Dato' Hashim Abdullah commented on accountability and that the financial auditors need to be changed every three years.

The CEO responded that steps will be taken to replace the current auditors.

ii. Dr. Errol Hewett, enquired about the effectiveness of using portals such as Freshplaza and e-trade.

The CEO replied that by placing advertisements in Freshplaza, TFNet received numerous enquiries on its activities for the recent symposium that was held in Guangzhou, China. International companies responded by enquiring on the programme book advertising rates. Freshplaza contains information on multinationals and companies trading in tropical fruits plus news on the current market and trade of horticultural products.

Regarding e-trade, CEO explained that it contains information on companies dealing with tropical fruit trade. The data available is currently not complete and TFNet seeks the assistance of member countries to provide updated information regularly so that can be shared to stakeholders.

Dr. Hewett further suggested that TFNet explore the possibility of collaborating with other trade portals by linking to their sites.

iii. Upon mention of the fruit database, Dr. Sisir Mitra commented that TFNet has to be careful in classifying fruits as major, minor, underutilized, or rare since this categorisation is different for every country.

The CEO responded that the present categorisation for the fruits is based on trade volume. He requested for more inputs from country members on the other fruit types available in their countries.

iv. Mr. Kaison Chang commented that eventhough TFNet had carried out the programs in the Strategic Plan of 2009-2011, there were still some areas that need improvement.

TFNet needs to ensure more participation in events like the General Assembly. He cited the example of the last Intergovernmental Group meeting in Cameroun but the TFNet workshop was held before the IGG in Nigeria. He shared that such events should be held back to back at the same locality.

On membership, Mr. Chang suggested for TFNet to participate in the Intergovernmental Group (IGG) meeting on Bananas and Tropical Fruits organised by FAO. This is an opportunity to create synergies with countries sharing common interests.

The CEO responded that TFNet had been attending all the IGG meeting on Bananas and Tropical Fruits for the past two years and participated actively to promote TFNet and its possible collaborative activities.

Mr. Chang also suggested that TFNet should participate in forthcoming proposed workshop on superfruits which has been planned back to back with the forthcoming Intergovernmental Meeting (IGG) in Latin America.

v. Mr. Chang also stressed that marketability is important. In order for TFNet to achieve that, it needs to build its experts roster. He added that funding agencies always have a need for experts on all fields. TFNet should be ready to respond to any inquiry to build up its capability as an organisation.

The CEO agreed and informed that TFNet is seriously engaged with various organisations and experts to build up the expert list.

- vi. Mr. Chang also commented that TFNet's capability statement wasn't clear and suggested it to be relooked and improved. A one-page statement was recommended.
- vii. Dr. Hewett suggested that the 7500 membership database of ISHS should be integrated with TFNet's. He offered to organize a meeting between TFNet and ISHS to improve the database. He agreed with Mr. Chang that funding organizations only need to be aware of TFNet. He recommended that TFNet to participate in international symposia and promote the website. He encouraged TFNet to participate in the forthcoming International Horticulture Conference in Brisbane, Australia in 2014.

The CEO agreed on the proposal.

vii. Dr. Badreldin enquired on the steps taken to strengthen the TFNet African Network and also suggested that TFNet should engage with organisations in the region such as Arab Organization for Agricultural Development (AOAD), Asian Development Bank, Islamic Development Bank and others for funding opportunities.

The CEO explained that in order for the Regional Network to function effectively, more countries in the region should become member of TFNet. TFNet will continue to build up membership in the African TFNet.

viii. Dr. Yi Ganjun said that during his 10-year membership with TFNet, he observed that it has grown substantially with country members. He agreed that IGG is an important platform for TFNet to increase membership.

The CEO encouraged that members should also provide information and assistance, especially in membership expansion, project and funding opportunities.

The TFNet Progress Report 2009-2012 was adopted by the General Assembly.

# agenda item 5

### TFNet Action Plan for 2012-2015

The CEO reported on the program and strategic directions for the period of 2012-2015 and the estimated income and expenditure as shown in **Annex 4**.

He emphasised on the need of increasing membership, being financial sustainable and improving product and services. TFNet is targeting to achieve a total membership of 250 by 2015. He also envisaged that all the strategic initiatives proposed will be implemented during the term 2012-2015.

The initiatives include increasing country and other membership categories, promote and market services of TFNet, source funding of projects from international organisations and satisfying members.

CEO also presented the proposed budget for 2012-2015 and projects that will focus on issues that are prevalent in the agricultural sector such as climate change, food security, increasing smallholders income, food safety and quality and market access.

In relations to strategic directions, the following issues and recommendations were discussed by the General Assembly.

### A. INTERNATIONAL ROLE

i. H.E. Dato' Hashim suggested that TFNet should provide a forum for the transfer of technology from researchers to end users. He suggested to conduct trade exhibitions for farmers. Going back to the strategic directions, he believes that international trade should be given emphasis. SPS issues should be discussed among authorities. He discussed 3 areas that are important: 1) Production of raw materials, 2) processing, and 3) promotion and marketing. He added that the produced goods should meet the demands of the market. For processing, certain countries have high standards in packaging, labelling, etc. He said that TFNet should provide information on these standards. Finally, TFNet must be able to bridge the gap between researchers and farmers.

The CEO, agreed to facilitate with some of the activities that can benefit member countries.

ii. Mr. Frank Lam identified that the real challenge is providing market information. For Central America, IICA has a Market Intelligence Platform. Mr. Lam mentioned that IICA is willing to share with TFNet the methodology of gathering market information. He added that institutional capacity can be strengthened by building the gap between private and public institutions. Furthermore, policy institutions should be targeted. He said that TFNet has the potential to bridge this gap.

- iii. Australian Representative Mr. Robert Williams said that development programs will not work without engaging the private sector. Researchers do not know the real problems that farmers and retailers face. These stakeholders should be included during meetings to identify the real problems. This can help researchers to address the real issues. Commercial players also need to see the value of these meetings. They are needed to move forward with the strategic directions.
- iv. Dr. Hewett noticed that some activities were focused on Malaysia. He suggested TFNet to have a more global approach. He stressed that organizing trade fairs are expensive and there are other ways to facilitate trade.
- v. Dr. Mitra said that TFNet should reach out to possible members. He suggested that the needs of members, especially countries, need to be prioritized.
- vi. Mr. Lam added that TFNet should come to countries with solutions. He says that IICA has been working on this and can help TFNet out. They will be meeting the Produce Marketing Association in California on October and suggested TFNet to participate.
- vii. Dr. Trinh Khac Quang said that a big problem in Vietnam is the low price of its tropical fruits and lack of market information. He encouraged TFNet to organise a training course on fruit processing for member countries to mitigate the glut of low prices. He also suggested that TFNet should also facilitate in the germplasm exchange activities and this could become an important programme between member countries.
  - The CEO mentioned that TFNet is in the process of organising a fruit processing workshop in Fiji and such activities can be replicated in Vietnam.
- viii. Dr. Minh Chau suggested for TFNet to join Vietnam's fruit festival next year.
- ix. Dr. Badreldin commented that many developing countries are faced with ineffective extension services on agricultural technology transfer. He suggested that TFNet to provide a platform for such activities in the future.
  - The CEO highlighted that generally extension activities are done by the extension organisation of the country. TFNet can provide the capacity building to train the trainers.
- x. HE Wassfi Hassan El-Sreihin, CEO of AARDO supported the TFNet programmes and willing to share their experiences and work together in future programmes
- xi. HE Hashim added that there is a lack of researchers in certain fields. He says that The Malaysian government is willing to pay consultants for their expertise. TFNet canassist to identify the experts.
- xii. HE Commodore Esala Teleni, The Ambassador of Fiji to China, said that TFNet should not focus too much on getting members. He believes that TFNet should focus on helping current member countries and integrate with key stakeholders. To attract non-members, TFNet has to look at the country's needs.
- xiii. Mr. Nianjun Shen said that CFC is an autonomous intergovernmental financial institution that funds projects. He mentioned CFC was involved in the financing the TFNet workshop in Lagos, Nigeria. He also mentioned that the citrus project

needs to be updated and that TFNet was unable to win the bid for the mango project in Tanzania. Since it is their mandate to finance commodity development, he believes that CFC and TFNet can collaborate. He informed that CFC is veering towards co-financing with private organizations. Thus, projects with a private partner will more likely get the requested funding.

- xiv. Mr. Williams explained that funders such as ACIAR and AusAID are willing to cofinance projects. As mentioned, ACIAR is only proving fund for capacity building in research work and not for the agricultural extension work.
- xv. Dr. Hewett followed-up Mr. William's comment and said that extension is now a paid service. Several internet applications and programs have been used as a tool for extension services. For these endeavours, champions from each member country are needed. For example, Dr. Lisa Kitinoja, developed an extension service using Linkedin.com. She provides information and training programs for people around the world. TFNet can work in this direction.

Dr. Hewett also mentioned an organization related to the Commonwealth that works directly with farmers, especially women. TFNet can explore the possibility of working with this organization.

xvi. Dr. Zhong Guangyan inquired if TFNet can provide scholarships for PhD students.

The CEO answered that TFNet has not reached that stage. Mr. Williams, HE Hashim, and Dr. Mitra agreed but suggested that TFNet can provide information on where to get scholarships in their website.

xvii. As a closing statement Dr. Yi acknowledged the efforts by the TFNet Secretariat in following the strategic plan. However, TFNet needs more membership and more funding. He stressed that the member-countries and the board are also responsible in helping the Secretariat. Market and institutional support, as well as funding from financing institutions, are crucial in building the network. He added that fruit exhibitions may be done to tap the businessmen, including more than 50,000 in South China alone. Hence, the website and printed newsletters are crucial tools. TFNet also needs to hire an economist to focus on market research and consumer studies. He suggested that board meetings should also be done at least once a year among member-countries.

### B. TFNet Network Management

The CEO outlined the interim working mechanism for the functioning of TFNet Regional Networks. He also indicated that TFNet has been working with IICA to plan for the Latin American and Carribbean Network. TFNet will also continue to expand the African Network through a workshop in Sudan this year. He requested members to provide ideas and inputs on setting up of the regional networks. The CEO said that terms of references in managing the regional networks will be prepared.

Dr. Hewett suggested that TFNet could emulate other network organisations such as Banana Network in setting up the regional networks.

### C. Appointment of Bureau Officers in Member Countries

The CEO requested member countries to appoint a bureau officer or contact person who can assist TFNet in procuring information with regard to fruit production, trade and prices. The contact person or bureau officer will assist in getting companies or individuals to join TFNet. TFNet will consider inviting them for a centralised training session in any one of the member countries.

# D. TFNet/Inter American Institute for Agricultural Cooperation (IICA) Collaboration

- i. The CEO also explained on the collaboration between TFNet and Inter American Institute for Agricultural Cooperation. A meeting will be held soon to discuss on the membership from Latin America and Caribbean.
- ii. IICA representative invited CEO of TFNet to meet and discuss the details with the stakeholders within the Latin American and Caribbean Region.

The General Assembly adopted the Strategic directions of TFNet for the period 2012 – 2015.

He also congratulated other members who have been elected to the Board of Trustees 2012-2015 and urged them to participate actively in achieving the objectives and strategic initiatives outlined in the Assembly. He thanked all the members of previous BOT for their contributions. He also extended a warm welcome to Australia for joining TFNet as a county member.

The Chairperson also thanked the Secretariat for all the arrangements made during the meeting.

# agenda item 11

### 6TH SESSION OF TFNET BOARD OF TRUSTEES MEETING

### 1. Election of Board Chairperson

The representative of the Government of Malaysia, HE Dato' Mohd Hashim Abdullah was re- elected as the Chairperson of TFNet BOT for the term 2012-2015. The Vice Chairpersons elected were Dr. Yi Ganyun and Dr. Trinh Khac Quang, representatives from China and Vietnam, respectively.

The newly elected Chairperson thanked all the members of the board for supporting him to continue to chair the BOT of TFNet for the period 2012-2015. He also assured that Malaysia will continue to support all the activities organised by TFNet.

### PROGRESS REPORT (2009-2012)

### 1. Introduction

This report covers July 2009 to May 2012. Since the Strategy Plan Workshop in February 2009, TFNet has embarked on various activities to address the following key issues:

- a. Membership;
- b. Financial Sustainability;
- c. Corporate Communication;
- d. Product and Services; and
- e. Capacity Building.

The 2009–2011 plan identified 3 major thrusts:

- to increase membership, particularly country and institutional members;
- to be financially self-sustaining; and
- to promote TFNet as a capable International Organisation.

Membership grew by 26% from 119 in 2009 to 145 June 2012. The present membership composed of 12 Country Members, 15 Associate Members and 119 Ordinary Members. Country membership increased by 140% from 5 in 2009 to 12 in 2012.

TFNet continued its efforts to be financially self sustaining by carrying out consultancy services and facilitating international workshops. The details of these projects are presented in this report.

Besides engaging with experts on tropical fruits, TFNet is gradually building itself as a credible international network by organizing conferences, symposiums, seminar and workshops and participating in activities organised by other institutions,

### 2. Activities of TFNet

### 2.1. Seminars and Symposiums

TFNet was organized 1 international seminar and co-organized four others. Overall, an estimated 2000 participants from at least 15 countries participated in these conferences and seminars. The list of seminars and symposiums are summarized in Table 1.

### 2.2. Workshops

TFNet organised 5 workshops on 2009-2011. Two of the workshops were funded by CFC and FAO while the rest were jointly funded by the host government. A total of 300 participants from more than 20 countries participated in these workshops. The resource persons for these workshops were from member countries and other international organisations (Table 2).

The issues faced by tropical fruit smallholders and commercial growers include:

- a. Low income of smallholder fruit growers;
- b. Losses from poor postharvest handling;
- c. Market access;
- d. Lack of value-adding fruit processing;
- e. Consistent supply of the product;
- f. Conforming to SPS requirements of importing countries; and
- g. Pest and disease problems.

TFNet had tailored its workshops according to these issues that were prevalent in the region or country.

#### 4. Other Activities with TFNet involvement

#### i. TFNet Side Event, 8th December 2009, FAO, Rome

The side event was attended by 17 delegates, of which 8 were country representatives from Indonesia, Philippines, Oman and Malaysia. The other delegates were from the various divisions of the FAO.

The objective of the side event were:

- a) To explain TFNet core activities and member benefits to Country representatives and observers.
- b) To highlight the current scenario of the tropical fruit industry, especially in the areas of postharvest management; value chain efficiency; nutritional and health benefits; and the potential of underutilized and indigenous fruits for nutrition, health and livelihood of the rural community.
- c) To attract more countries and other organizations to become members of TFNet.
- ii. 5th Session of the Intergovernmental Group (IGG) on Bananas and Tropical Fruits, 3 5 May 2011, Yaounde, Cameroon.

The 5th IGG session provided the forum:

- a. To notify the establishment of an African Tropical Fruit Network, which was discussed during the Workshop on Enhancing Participation in the Value Chain and Establishing Links to the Market for Tropical Fruit Smallholders in Africa in Lagos, Nigeria on 28-29 April 2011.
- b. To actively participate in the discussion on new projects being proposed and discussed on the 5th IGG session.
- c. Participation on the IGG's Proposed Projects for 2011-2013

TFNet agreed to participate in the working group on:

- 1. Information system on plantains
- 2. Surveillance and eradication of fruit fly on Banana
- iii. Workshop on Dissemination of Project "Diversification of Agriculture in Guatemala and Mexico (Chiapas) through the production and exports of fruits" and challenges and opportunities for smallholders integration in the international fruits value chain Cristobal de Las Casas, Mexico-17-19 November 2010 (CFC/FAO)

TFNet was invited to present a paper on "Smallholders integration into the fruits value chain-Asia case studies" at the workshop. TFNet took the opportinuty to discuss the establishment of the Latin American Tropical Fruit Network.

#### 5. TFNet Website and information dissemination

#### i. The TFNet Website

Work on upgrading the website began in November 2009 with the objective of making it more accessible. Other changes include the main page format and to include articles on tropical fruits by TFNet members. In May 2012, the website format was amended to allow comments, improving interaction. An important feature of the website is the registration of experts who can be engaged as consultants for TFNet. Facebook and Twitter integration have been incorporated.

## ii. Fruit Information Page

Comprehensive technical information for 20 different tropical fruit types are available in the database. The list for major and minor fruit types have been completed and efforts are now focused to include more information on underutilized and rare fruits.

#### iii. Tropical Fruit Trade Directory

TFNet Tropical Fruit TRADE Directory provides information on tropical fruit products. TFNet members and registered users of this website can promote and market their produce and products.

Efforts are being made to have a comprehensive list of major tropical fruit traders in the world. Member countries are expected to provide information for this section.

#### iv. TFNetSTAT

TFNetSTAT provides international tropical fruits statistics for all TFNet Members. The available data includes statistics on production, area, import, and export value. Users can query the data based on selection criteria and the result will be shown in both tabular form and graphical representation.

#### v. E-newsletter

E-newsletters are emailed to all members and others to promote TFNet. Members have been requested to provide information and news that can be published. Since November 2011, TFNet e-newsletters are circulated every 2 months

## vi. Expert / Resource person registration

This feature was incorporated in the website to source for experts in the various fields. So far, 59 have registered.

## 6. TFNet Membership

During the period (2010 - 2012), membership grew by 26% from 119 in 2009 to 145 on June 2012. The present membership comprises of 12 Country Members, 15 Associate Members and 119 Ordinary Members.

In addition, Sri Lanka indicated to join TFNet by end of 2012. Efforts are ongoing to invite Ethiopia, Myanmar, and Cuba.

Collaboration with The Inter-American Institute for Cooperation on Agriculture (IICA), which caters to the Caribbean region and Central America, will begin November 2012 to encourage membership and establish the Latin American Tropical Fruit Network.

The current membership status by category is as follows:

- i. Country Members: 12 Australia, Bangladesh, China, Fiji, India, Indonesia, Malaysia, Nigeria, Philippines, Sudan, Syria and Vietnam (increase from 5 countries in 2009 to 12 in 2012)
- ii. Associate members: 15
- iii. Ordinary Members: 119 (from 96 in August 2009 to 119 in May 2012), an increase of 23%).

## 7. Finance and Administration

## a. Audited Financial Report

The audited financial report is summarized in the Income and Expenditure Statement in Table 4. Figure 1 shows the trend of income and expenditure for the last three years.

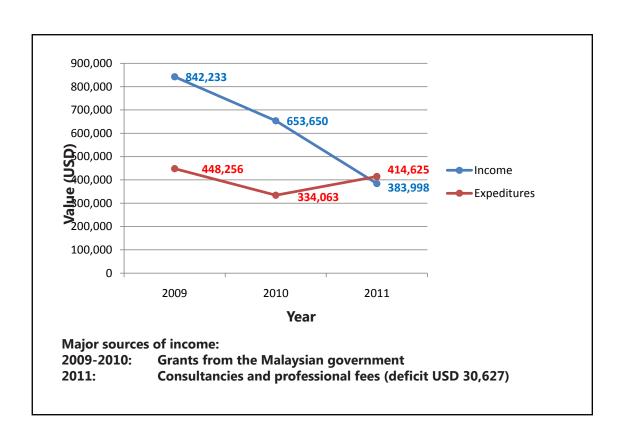

#### **Explanatory notes:**

- 1. Major source of income in years 2009 and 2010 were from the grants received from the Malaysian Government where in year 2011 was from consultancy and professional fees.
- 2. Total income for year 2010 declined by 22% from total income received in year 2009. In 2010, total income is declined by 41% from year 2010. The declines were attributed mainly from the reduced grant received from the Malaysian government.
- 3. Administrative and staff costs were two major expenditures from year 2009 through year 2011. Increase in administrative costs in year 2009 was due to writing off bad debts amounting to USD 105,365.
- 4. Total expenditure was reduced by 25% in year 2010 from year 2009 but in year 2011 were increased by 24% from year 2010 due to workshop activities.

## TFNet Action Plan and Future Directions for 2012 – 2015

### a. Membership

The Secretariat has made efforts via diplomatic channels, institutional approaches, and personal contacts to increase country membership. TFNet had also invited potential countries to participate as observers during the TFNet BOT meetings and other functions. TFNet expanded the ordinary members to include horticultural and fruit experts and fruit traders and exporters. The membership target for 2012-2015 is shown in Table 5.

## c. Corporate Communication

TFNet, through the established linkages and network, has effectively communicated various entities and clients by providing with information through newsletters and websites on tropical fruits industry. The bi-monthly e-newsletter has been sent to more than 1000 readers all over the world.

Activities are regularly carried out at all functions both locally and internationally. These activities will continue to be pursued in coming years to further engage with the industry.

## d. Linkages with existing Regional Network

TFNet has engaged with CFC, ACMA, ICIPE, AARDO, Bioversity, Crop for the Future, CAB International, universities, International Mango Organization, and other international institutions. TFNet will continue to collaborate with more organizations for the benefit of stakeholders.

## e. Establishment of TFNet Regional Network

Establishment of regional networks is being pursued. In 2011, the TFNet - African Tropical Fruit Network was formalised. In November 2012, TFNet is planning to organise a Workshop in Central America (Costa Rica). During this event, the establishment of Latin American Tropical Fruit Network will be formalised.

## d. Programs and Activities planned for 2012 - 2015

The programs are based on the objectives of TFNet to promote the production, processing, marketing, consumption, and trade of tropical fruits. Some of the activities shown below are multiple in their objectives. The activities planned are summarised in Table 6.

#### f. Conclusion

TFNet will continue to embark on strategic initiatives as a catalyst for promoting cooperation and information sharing among member countries through various platforms, organize capacity building programs, provide technical services an consultancies, and disseminate holistic information on tropical fruits.

# Notes to the financial statements for the year ended 31 December 2010

## 1. Principal activities

International Tropical Fruits Network (TFNet) is an independent global network set up under the auspices of the Food and Agriculture Organisation (FAO) of the United Nations and was declared as an International Organisation on 23 January 2003 through the gazetting of the International Tropical Fruits Network (Privileges and Immunities) Regulations 2003. It is both inter-governmental and inter-institutional in nature and reports its activities to the subgroups on tropical fruits of the FAO inter-governmental group on bananas and on tropical fruits. TFNet act as a network to promote the production, processing, marketing, consumption and international trade of tropical fruits. The objectives of TFNet are:-

- to systematically collect, analyse, document and disseminate information on production, processing, marketing, consumption and international trade of tropical fruits to all members;
- b) to promote, coordinate and support conservation of germplasm, research and development and transfer of technologies in production and post-harvest handling including downstream processing for industrial use;
- c) to facilitate the expansion of international trade of tropical fruits;
- d) to enhance human resource development in the tropical fruits sector;
- e) to organise generic market promotion in collaboration with exporters and importers aimed at strengthening customer knowledge of the nutritional value of tropical fruits;
- f) to monitor and evaluate the impact of international and regional agreements on production, marketing, consumption and international trade of tropical fruits; and
- g) to facilitate technical and economical cooperation in the tropical fruits sector in pursuance of sustainable production, strengthening of domestic market, poverty eradication and food security.

## 2. Basis of preparation

## 2.1 Compliance

The financial statements of the Company have been prepared in accordance with the provision of the International Tropical Fruits Network Regulations 2003 and Accounting Standards for Private Entities.

## 2.2 Presentation Currency

The currency expressed in the financial statements is in Ringgit Malaysia and the amounts are expressed in unit of Ringgit.

## 2. Financial risk management policies

The Organisation's financial risk management policy seeks to ensure that adequate financial resources are available for the development of the Organisation's businesses whilst managing its risks. The Organisation operates within clearly defined guidelines that are approved by the Board and the Organisation's policy is not to engage in speculative transactions.

The main areas of financial risks faced by the Organisation and the policy in respect of the major areas of treasury activity are set out as follows:

#### a. <u>Foreign currency risk</u>

The Organisation is exposed to foreign currency risk as a result of its normal trading activities, both external and intra-organisation where the currency denomination differs from the local currency, Ringgit Malaysia (RM). The Organisation's policy is to minimise the exposure of overseas operating to transaction risk by matching local currency income against local currency costs.

## b. <u>Liquidity and Cash Flow risks</u>

The Organisation seeks to achieve a balance between certainty of funding and a flexible, cost-effective borrowing structure. This is to ensure that at the minimum, all projected net borrowing needs are covered by committed facilities. Also, the objective for debt maturity is to ensure that the amount of debt maturing in any one year is not beyond the Organisation's means to repay and refinance.

## 3. Accounting policies

## 3.1 Basis of accounting

The financial statements of the Organisation have been prepared under the historical cost convention unless otherwise indicated.

## 3.2 Property, plant and equipment

Property, plant and equipment are initially stated at cost. All other property, plant and equipment are stated at historical cost less accumulated depreciation and impairment losses.

Depreciation is provided on the straight-line method in order to write off the cost of each asset to its residual value over its estimated useful life. The principal rates used are as follows:-

Property, plant and equipment are written down to recoverable amounts if, the recoverable amounts are less than their carrying values. Recoverable amount is the higher of an asset's net selling price and its value in use.

## 3.3 Receivables

Receivables are carried at anticipated realisable values. Bad debts are written off in the period in which they are identified. An allowance is made for doubtful debts based on a review of all outstanding amounts at the balance sheet date.

## 3.4 Foreign currency transaction and balances

Transactions in foreign currencies during the year are converted into Ringgit Malaysia at rates of exchange approximating those prevailing at the transaction dates.

Monetary assets and liabilities in foreign currency at balance sheet date are translated into Ringgit Malaysia at rates of exchange approximationg those ruling on that date.

Exchange gains and losses are charged to the income statement.

## 3. Accounting policies (cont'd)

#### 3.5 Cash flow statement

The Organisation adopts the indirect method in the preparation of cash flow statement.

Cash and cash equivalents comprise cash at bank, in hand and fixed deposits.

## 3.6 Impairment of assets

The carrying amounts of assets, other than inventories, assets arising from construction contracts, deferred tax assets and financial assets (other than investments in subsidiaries, associates and jointly controlled entity) are reviewed for impairment when there is an indication that the assets might be impaired. Impairment is measured by comparing the carrying values of the assets with their recoverable amounts. The recoverable amount is the higher of an asset's net selling price and its value in use, which is measured by reference to discounted future cash flows. Recoverable amounts are estimated for individual asset, or if it is not possible, for the cash-generating unit.

An impairment loss is recognised as an expense in the income statement immediately, unless it reverses a previous revaluation, in which case it is treated as a revaluation decrease.

Any subsequent increase in the recoverable amount of an asset is treated as reversal of the previous impairment loss and is recognised to the extent of the carrying amount of the asset that would have been determined (net of amortisation or depreciation) had no impairment loss been recognised. The reversal is recognised in the income statement immediately, unless the asset is carried at revalued amount. A reversal of an impairment loss on a revalued asset is credited directly to revaluation surplus. To the extent that an impairment loss on the same revalued asset was previously recognised as an expense in the income statement, a reversal of that impairment loss is recognised as income in the income statement.

## 3. Accounting policies (cont'd)

## 3.7 Payables

Payables are stated at cost which is the consideration to be paid in the future for goods and services rendered.

## 3.8 Employee benefits

## **Short Term Employee Benefits**

Wages, salaries and social security contributions are recognised as an expense in the year in which the associated services are rendered by employees of the Organisation. Short term accumulating compensated absences such as paid annual leave are recognised when employees render services that increase their entitlement to future compensated absences. Non-accumulating compensated absences, such as sick and medical leaves are recognised when the absences occur.

The expected cost of accumulating compensated absences is measured as the additional amount expected to be paid as a result of the unused entitlements that have accumulated at the balance sheet date.

#### **Defined Contribution Plan**

Contributions to the Employees Provident Fund scheme are recognised as an expense in the income statement in the period to which they relate.

## 3.9 Revenue recognition

- i. Grant received is recognised on receipt basis.
- ii. Members' annual subscriptions and registration fees, fixed deposit interest and income from seminars, exhibitions and other activities are recognised on accrual basis.

#### 3.10 Financial instruments

Financial instruments carried on the balance sheet include cash and bank balances, fixed deposits, receivables and payables. The recognition methods adopted are disclosed in the respective accounting policy statements.

## 3.11 Government grants

Grants in recognition of specific expenses are taken to income over the period necessary to match them with related cost they are intended to compensate.

#### 14.2 Credit Risk
